## 3. Professions

People associate many jobs with gender. For example, a certain job is more seen as a woman's job, and another job as a male job. This is due to the character traits we connect to men and women. For example, women are more seen as loving and caring, which makes them better in childcare. Men are seen as stronger and tough, so they fit better as a construction worker. But it's important that children know they can do everything they want to do. Men can be good with children as well and woman can be strong construction workers too.

## 4. Let's switch!

Explanation: The children need to stand in the shoes of the other sex, so let's switch! The boys have to do 'women's' activities and the girls have to do 'men's' activities.

## Boys:

- Cooking: the boys go into the kitchen and cook a meal for the girls. This can best be supervised by at least 1 teacher.
- Coconut scraping: whoever can scrape the coconut the fastest wins.


## Girls:

- Rope pulling: With this game, you can form groups of 2 people (pairs). The teacher holds the rope. All children now grab the rope. You can look at the picture below. When the teacher lets go of the strings, the children must pull the rope. The strongest pair wins.

- Football or cricket: These sports are seen as 'men’s sports'. But girls can do this too! ;-)
! Sidenote: You can make different variants of this game. For example: cry contests, talk about feelings, etc. To promote cooperation between boys and girls, you can also do the activities together.
